#### From the Pastor's Desk

"One Move...Is All We Need"

As our Lenten journey "marches" on this month, the following story – from San Diego, CA – reminds us of what our true focus needs to be during this time of spiritual reflection.

A ten-year old boy was in a devastating car accident in which he lost his left arm. He was determined to continue doing everything his friends did. He learned to shoot a basket and pitch a ball with one arm. When his friends decided to study martial arts, he resolved to do the same.

The boy began lessons with an old Japanese judo master. Every day, after school, he would head over to the studio. And every day, the sensei would show him only one move. Day after day, week after week, over three months of training, the master had taught him only this one move. "Sensei," the boy finally said, "shouldn't I be learning more moves, some blocks and kicks?"

"This is the only move you know," the sensei replied, "but this is the only move you need to know."

Not quite understanding, but believing his teacher, the boy kept training. Several months later, the sensei took the boy to his first tournament. Surprising himself, the boy easily won his first two matches. The third match proved to be more difficult, but after some time, his opponent became impatient and charged. The boy deftly used his one move to win the match. Still amazed by his success, the boy was now in the finals.

This time, his opponent was bigger, stronger, and more experienced. For a

while, the young boy appeared to be overmatched. Concerned that this newcomer might get hurt, the referee called a time-out. He was about to stop the match when the sensei intervened. "No," the sensei insisted, "let him continue." Soon after the match resumed, his opponent made a critical mistake: he dropped his guard. Instantly, the boy used his move to pin him. The boy won the match and the tournament. He was the champion.

On the way home, the boy and his sensei reviewed each move in every match. The boy finally summoned the courage to ask what was really on his mind. "Sensei, how did I win the tournament with only one move?"

"You won for two reasons," the sensei answered. "First, because you studied nothing else, you have mastered one of the most difficult throws in all of judo. And second, the only known defense for that move is for your opponent to grab your left arm."

The event that draws our attention throughout the Lenten Season - the death of our Lord Jesus Christ - isn't just one Bible story among many; one mighty move of God along with many others. It is the act of God, the one, the whole story. Every page of Scripture, every Lesson we hear and read all year, everything God does for us every day, is about and because of Jesus extending His two arms on the cross to defeat our every enemy and bring us back together with God.

And that one move is all we need.



# Recipes from Immanuel's Members

When you have a sweet tooth and want to stay on track, here's a nice treat.

Sugar is NOT an added ingredient.

3 mashed bananas (ripe)

1/3 c. apple sauce

2 c. oats

1/4 c. almond milk

½ c. raisins (optional)

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. cinnamon

Bake at 350° for 15-20 minutes



#### **Oatmeal Bread**

Makes 2 loaves 350° 30-40 minutes



#### Combine in large bowl:

1 c. quick oats

½ c. whole wheat flour

½ c. brown sugar

1 Tbsp. salt

2 Tbsp. margarine

#### **Pour over:**

2 c. boiling water

Stir in to combine.

#### Dissolve:

1 pkg. (1 Tbsp.) dry yeast in

½ c. warm water

When batter is cooled to lukewarm, add yeast. Stir in:

5 c. white flour

When dough is stiff enough to handle, turn onto floured board and knead 5-10 min. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise until doubled. Punch down and let rise again. Shape into 2 loaves and place in greased 9x5x3" pans. Bake at 350° for 30-40 min. Cool on rack, brushing loaves with margarine for soft crust.


