From the Pastor's Desk

"This Is Love"

(Jesus said) "This is My commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that someone lays down his life for his friends." John 15:12-13

You probably don't know John Baca.

Even so, for many he's a poster boy for this month's Valentine's Day.

Born in January of 1949, Baca grew up in San Diego. I'd love to say he was always a good kid, but the truth is he was in and out of juvenile hall numerous times. Eventually, he fulfilled the conditions of his parole and was drafted into the military.

On February 10, 1970, Baca led his unit through intense fire to rescue a platoon, which was pinned down. Successful in setting up a protected firing position, Baca and his pals started to fight back. That was when a fragmentation grenade was thrown into the middle of him and his pals. Without hesitation, Baca covered the grenade with his helmet and covered his helmet with his body.

On top of his helmet – that's where Baca was when the grenade exploded.

That was love. No, that's not the smoochy-smoochy kind of love most people celebrate this month. It's not the candy or the flowers or the candlelight dinner kind of love most will share.

It's the kind of love, which on June 15, 1971, had the Medal of Honor bestowed on John Baca.

It's also the kind of love the Lord spoke about in John, chapter 15 – the kind of love that's willing to die for a friend.

That's the kind of love John Baca had. It's certainly the love that Jesus has.

No, that's not quite right. Jesus has a love that's far greater than that of John Baca. You see, while Baca was ready to die for his friends, he was also willing to shoot at his enemies. Jesus was crucified for those who loved Him, but also for those who hated Him, who mocked Him, spit on Him, whipped Him and beat Him.

He also died to save sinners like you and me.

This is why even as we celebrate God's blessed gift of earthly love, we also give thanks for the fact God so loved the sinful world He gave His only Son.

PRAYER: Dear Lord, today I give thanks for the many people who have loved me. I also wish to express gratitude for the opportunity of showing love to others. Most of all I am moved by the love of the Savior who gave His life so I might be forgiven and live forever. May I reflect such a selfless, giving love to others. In Jesus' Name I pray it. Amen.

Mission Grant Story


"In Their Hands and Upon Their Hearts" — Lutheran Bible Translators, Angola, Botswana, Ethiopia, Namibia \$50,000

Young at Heart


Winter Greetings and Blessings to all our "over age 50" members and friends.

Some of those donations allowed us to replace our original red doors, hang our beautiful Pre-School sign, and professionally paint our gorgeous ceilings. Dear Immanuel Lutheran Members and Friends,

Exciting change is occurring on a daily basis in the school. Our enrollment is up to 60 and we have more enrollments pending for February. As we plan for next year we are planning for more growth.

Our Pre-Kindergarten classes have now moved into the main building. A lot went into this move. Hard work, a lot of time, and willing, positive attitudes were all part of the mix. Second and Third Grade were the first to move as they moved from the first floor to the second floor. Art moved from the second floor to the old school. The new empty rooms on the first floor were prepared by stripped and waxing the floors, cleaning the walls, moving white-

boards and smartboards, and altering restrooms. A lot of time was spent setting up all of the relocated classrooms. It was a lot of work, but worth it. I have heard very positive comments about this change from parents, students, and staff.

Pastor is initiating Pre-Chapel for Pre-Kindergarten through Grade 1, which will take place in the sanctuary at 10:15 each Wednesday. A typical Pre-Chapel will include a Bible story, a song, and a verse of five words or less. Kindergarten and Grade 1 students will serve as the Big Buddies to the Pre-Kindergarteners. These students know what Big Buddies do from their partnership with the middle school students to this point in the year. They have had great teachers. The regular chapel services will remain at 10:45 and now includes grades 2-8.

Our students enjoyed themed days for National Lutheran Schools Week. They competed in a Penny War to benefit the American Cancer Society and a beachball rally in the gym. Everyone was a winner!

The five ILS Odyssey of the Mind teams are preparing for the upcoming state meet on March 18 at Connecticut Southern University. We are looking forward to the event.

Our PTO hosted a Family Science Night on January 26. It was well attended and a lot was learned by all. The event took place in the old school basement where the Connecticut Science Center set up eighteen stations of activities. We appreciate all that the PTO does to provide these enrichment opportunities for the students, and in this case, the families as well!

Please be patient as we make changes to the school to improve and grow.


