From the Pastor's Desk

"It Was Empty"

And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. 1 Corinthians 15:17-20

Philip was born with Down syndrome.

He was likeable, lovable, but coordination kept him from doing everything his classmates did. It was two weeks before Resurrection Sunday, and Philip's teacher gave each of her students a plastic egg. You know, the kind of colored eggs pantyhose used to come in.

She told them to bring back their eggs with something that reminded them of Easter. It could be a real object or a drawing they had done. Anything would work just fine.

The following week the class came back and each of the students opened and explained the meaning of the symbol they had brought in their plastic egg.

One egg held a pretty flower; another held a photograph of a butterfly. It was an incredibly exciting time and the kids were squirming to see what each person had brought. The volume kept getting louder as every student felt the need to explain his or her egg or evaluate the eggs of others.

But then, second to last, an egg was open which contained nothing. That's right. Zero. Zip. Nada. Nothing. The kids were speechless. At least for a moment they were speechless. Then came

the critique. No, critique is not the right word. Criticism is the right word.

One of the students commented "That's stupid!" or "Someone didn't do his homework!" or "Did their symbol get dropped on the floor? Where did it go?"

After a minute, Philip confessed: "That egg belongs to me. It's empty, because Jesus' grave was empty." It was, in the language of Martin Luther: a "Here I stand" moment

Philip got it, just as some 500 years before, Luther got it. Jesus' grave is empty and because of that our sins are forgiven. Because of God's *grace alone*, found in *Scripture alone*, received by *faith alone*, heaven awaits.

Yes, Philip got it. That summer Philip got something else: an infection. Most children would have shaken off such a little thing. Philip's body couldn't.

At his funeral, nine eight-year-old children, accompanied by their teacher, brought a gift and placed it in his casket. I don't have to explain it was a plastic egg. But there was nothing inside that egg.

It was empty – just as empty as Jesus' tomb.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, we give thanks for the resurrection which shows that Your work is complete and we have been forgiven and saved. May the world see what You have done as clearly as did Philip. In the Savior's Name we ask it. AMEN

Rev. Dr. Timothy C.J. Quill was guest preacher on October 3 at both services and at the 9:30 Bible Study.

Rev. Dr. Timothy C.J. Quill is a longtime professor of Concordia Theological Seminary (Fort Wayne, Indiana), having joined the faculty there in 1998. From 2002 onwards, he also served as Dean of International Studies. He further served for more than 20 years as director of the seminary's Russian Project, working with Lutherans throughout Russia and other Eastern Europe nations, as well as helping to establish the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk, Siberia. Dr. Quill also served The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod's Office of International Mission as director of Theological Education. On October 15, 2019, Dr. Quill was appointed as the General Secretary of the International Lutheran Council (ILC) following a unanimous vote of the ILC Board of Directors.

Dr. Quill graduated from Concordia Seminary (St. Louis, Missouri) in 1980 and served parishes in Connecticut (New Hartford) and Missouri before pursuing graduates work, ultimately earning his Ph. D. from Drew University in New Jersey. Since completing his work with Concordia Theological Seminary, he has served as a visitation pastor at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

Dr. Quill is married to Annette, nee Ziebell, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Their daughter Kathryn Ann is married to Rev. Paul Gaschler who serves Concordia Lutheran Church in Greenwood, Indiana.

The International Lutheran Council is a growing worldwide association of established confessional Lutheran church bodies which proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ on the basis of an unconditional commitment to the Holy Scriptures as the inspired Word of God and to the Lutheran Confessions contained in the Book of Concord as the true and faithful exposition of the Word of God.

The ILC is not a church body nor does it carry out churchly functions. It does not intend to prescribe any course of action for its members, but rather seeks to assist and strengthen them in their confessional witness and mission. It exists to encourage, strengthen, and promote confessional Lutheran theology and practice centering in Jesus Christ, both among member churches and throughout the world:

- By providing opportunities for the joint study of contemporary theological issues.
- By giving mutual support and encouragement to the heads of member church bodies.
- By encouraging and assisting member church in planning for mission outreach.
- By strengthening theological education through conferences of theologians and seminary teachers, mission staffs and those involved with human care.
- By facilitating communication between confessional Lutheran churches of the world through the publication of ILC News.
- By stimulating and facilitating the preparation and publication of confessional Lutheran literature.

Member church bodies contribute, on an annual basis, financial support (based on their baptized membership and the GNP of the country in which it exists) for the costs of operating ILC. Meetings of the ILC take place on the basis of a three year cycle – in year one, regional meetings takes place, in year two the entire Council meets in conference, and in year three, a conference of representatives from each of the ILC seminaries is held.

Grades 1-8 start each school day outside on the blacktop for fresh air and time with friends. When the bell rings, students line up by grade level at the curb for our morning opening. We welcome everyone, say the pledges, recite a verse they should remember for all time, recognize birthdays, give announcements, and close with either Luther's Morning Prayer or the Lord's Prayer. This is a nice way to start each day.

The school staff was very involved in the GermanFest with the Kinderland activities. These included a life-size Candy Land Game, a pretzel craft, a scavenger hunt, an estimation game, and a jump feature. Many school families attended the festival and a good time was had by all. Immanuel Lutheran School teachers manned all of these events throughout the festival. A special thanks to Katja Evans, who created and shared the Candy Land Game, and planned the Kinderland event with Rhoda Lang and the festival committee.

We appreciate the families who attended the Mum Parade to ride on, or walk with our Mum Parade Float. We hope there are many more attending next year. There was a lot of competition for everyone's time this year, which was one week after GermanFest. We hope to make it more of a priority for school families in the future. Spanish instruction has been added for Immanuel Lutheran School students. The PK3 through 3rd grade students receive group instruction twice a week with Heather Correa. Mayra Singh teaches Spanish for grades 4-8. Grades 4-6 receive instruction three times a week. Middle School students in grades 7 and 8 receive Spanish instruction daily. There is an advanced Spanish class for students who already speak the language. These students are learning to read and write in Spanish.

The school still needs Extended Care workers in the afternoon. This is a perfect job for college age adults, or responsible high school seniors, or an adult wanting something parttime. We also need lunch volunteers. If you are interested please call the office.
