

From the Pastor's Desk

"Swiftly Pass the Clouds of Glory"

"And as he (Jesus) was praying, the appearance of his face was altered, and his clothing became dazzling white."

Luke 9:29

On Sunday, February 27th, the Church will celebrate the <u>Transfiguration of Our Lord</u>. It brings an end to the Epiphany season and serves as a bridge to the coming season of Lent.

"Swiftly pass the clouds of glory, Heaven's voice, the dazzling light; Moses and Elijah vanish; Christ alone commands the height! Peter, James, and John fall silent, Turning from the summit's rise, Downward toward the shadowed valley, Where their Lord has fixed His eyes.

"Lord, transfigure our perceptions, With the purest light that shines, And recast our life's intentions, To the shape of Your designs, Till we seek no other glory, Than what lies past Calv'ry's hill, And our living and our dying, And our rising by Your will."

"Glory" can be difficult to define, but sometimes we wouldn't mind having a bit of it for ourselves. Jesus' disciples, James and John, wanted a share in the glory of Jesus' coming kingdom (see Mark 10:35-45). They did not yet understand that suffering would come first. Before the King would be crowned with glory, He would be crowned with thorns.

James and John may have requested a share in glory because they had recently seen their Lord transfigured in divine majesty. With Peter, these two disciples saw Jesus' face shine like the sun as His clothing became white as light. Moses and Elijah appeared to speak with Him. When the Father's voice called from aloud, "This is My beloved Son; listen to Him," the terrified disciples fell face down to the ground. But then, the glory, the voice, and

Moses and Elijah vanished. The frightened disciples looked up and "saw no one but Jesus only."

Peter had offered to build three tents to contain the glorious vision. The disciples wanted to share that glory; James and John certainly did. But they couldn't stay on the mountain. They had to turn toward "the shadowed valley where their Lord had fixed His eyes." There would be glory, for all eternity, but squarely in the road to that future glory stood a cross. As they left the mountain, Jesus spoke of His death and resurrection and told His disciples not to speak of the vision "until the Son of Man is raised from the dead." Puzzled by this talk of rising from the dead, the disciples followed Jesus as He turned toward the cross.

As we follow in Jesus' steps, we too may endure suffering. Yes, there will be glory – the glory of Jesus' resurrection and our own! – but the cross comes first. We pray that the Lord would "transfigure our perceptions" so that we seek only the glory that lies beyond the cross. It's the glory that's found in dying to self and rising, through Baptism, to new life in Christ Jesus. The week before He was transfigured, Jesus said to His disciples, "If anyone would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow Me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will find it." That's the only glory we seek, the glory of living, dying, and rising in Jesus.

THE PRAYER: Lord Jesus, strengthen us by Your Spirit to take up our cross and follow You until the day we share Your glory. In Your Name. AMEN.

New Forward In Faith Fund Established

The church council has established a new perpetual fund named "Forward In Faith" that will serve to meet the long-term needs of Immanuel Lutheran Church and School – with the goal of eliminating the need for individual capital campaign drives to solve urgent needs when they arise.

Forward In Faith will serve to create a "rainy day" fund -25% of every dollar given will be set aside and fully restricted for our future. The remaining 75% will also be restricted, however, accessible and managed by the church council as needed to address non-budgeted needs and projects and to maintain or update/upgrade our facilities. At times there may be no needs or projects, other times, there may be several simultaneously. Some small, others of great size. Regardless of the need, Forward In Faith will insure that we are better prepared for the needs of this congregation, our school, and all our facilities when they happen moving forward.

Lenten Worship

During Lent we prepare our hearts to receive our crucified and risen Lord by...

Decorating the church using violet. Violet, the color of royalty and repentance, is the color for Lent. In biblical times, violet dye was very expensive and could only be purchased by royalty or the very rich. The people of God our His royal priesthood (1 Peter 2:8-9). We decorate the church in the royal color of violet for our times of repentance — turning away from our sins and turning toward Christ for His mercy and forgiveness.

No longer singing Alleluia. Alleluia is a Hebrew word that means "Praise the Lord." It appears often in the Psalms and is a joyous expression of faith in God. During Lent, we do not use this joyous response in order to focus on our need for repentance and faith.

No longer singing the Gloria in Excelsis. Just as in Advent, so in Lent we give up singing the joyous Hymn of Praise. We do this to focus our worship on repentance.

Lent is a season that has a number of interesting customs: Ash Wednesday and the Imposition of Ashes. Lent always begins 40 weekdays before Easter on Ash Wednesday. The name comes from the ancient custom of the imposition of ashes. The pastor dips his thumb into some ashes (traditionally made from the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday) and

marks an ashy cross on each person's forehead while saying, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This custom uses the biblical image of ashes (Job 42:6) to remind us that we, too, shall die and therefore need forgiveness from Jesus.

Fasting. Fasting is giving up eating at a particular meal or time in order to devote that time to prayer and meditation on the Word of God. Jesus directed that His disciples would fast (Matthew 6:16-18), and the Small Catechism says that fasting is "fine outward training" before taking the Lord's Supper. Many Christians use Lent as a special time of fasting — especially on Fridays in remembrance of Good Friday when Jesus died on the cross.

Giving something up for Lent. It's similar to fasting, except instead of a meal a person might "give up" any favorite item: a toy, television, desserts, etc. The idea behind giving something up for Lent is to be reminded to pray, to study God's Word, and to think of Jesus' sacrifice when you miss the thing that you have given up.

Midweek services. Many churches observe Lent with special midweek services. These extra times of worship during the week help us to hear God's Word and prepare us to observe Holy Week and celebrate Easter.

More games will be added as we hear back from more schools.


2022-2023 School Registration

HISTORY REMEMBERED

IMMANUEL GETS A NEW PIPE ORGAN IN 1975

When I arrived at Immanuel in August of 1961, our pipe organ was already old. It had been designed by the Marr and Colton organ company. They mainly built organs for theaters because it was common for organ music to accompany the early silent films.

As the years went on, parts of the organ began to break down and soon some of the stops no longer worked. It was time for a change.

An Organ Committee was formed to bring a proposal to the congregation for a new instrument. The Allen Organ Company was a large manufacturer of church organs. Their instruments had no pipes and relied on electronic reproduction of sounds that had been recorded from pipes. These sounds were then put through an amplifier and speaker system into the church.

As the committee did its research there were two opinions that became clear. Two of the committee wanted a pipe organ, two wanted an electronic organ, with one still on the fence. After a trip to Staten Island, New York, to hear a large Allen installation I was convinced that the only way to go was pipes. However, it had to be a committee proposal. The 'swing' vote told me confidentially that we should go with a pipe organ. The vote was cast at our final meeting and we began to look for a pipe organ company.

After hearing 4 pipe organ installations, we finally voted to accept the proposal presented to us by the Austin Organ Company based in Hartford.

The organ chests contain 1,796 pipes; there are 33 ranks of pipes played from 4 separate keyboards; the final cost of the organ was \$68,816.

A former teacher at Immanuel, Roland Kuring, played the dedicatory recital in the winter of 1976. The first service in which it was used was Thanksgiving Day, 1976.


